We are pleased to welcome Kevin McNamara, Chief Executive of Gloucestershire Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust as the new Executive Chair for the SWAG Cancer Alliance, effective from 1 April. We are very grateful to Maria Kane for the time, dedication, and leadership she brought to the role of Executive Chair over the past few years. As we welcome Kevin McNamara, we look forward to continuing the great work of the Cancer Alliance under

his guidance and vision. The SWAG core team will continue to be hosted by North Bristol NHS Trust.

Annual Plan approved

Our Annual Plan has been officially approved by NHS England at both regional and national levels. The plan was praised for its ambition and the clarity of its improvement initiatives, which span a wide range of priorities - from enabling earlier and faster diagnosis, to improving access to timely treatment, reducing variation in care, and supporting people living with and beyond cancer. We now look ahead to the upcoming 10-Year Health Plan and the National Cancer Plan, expected later this year.

Cancer performance milestones achieved

One of our main priorities as a Cancer Alliance is to reduce waiting times for patients. We are proud to report that we have exceeded both national cancer performance targets for 2024/25:

- Faster Diagnosis Standard (FDS): 78.4% (target: 77%)
- 62-Day Urgent Referral to First Treatment: 72.7% (target: 70%)

This marks the second consecutive year of meeting these key performance goals. Our focus now shifts to achieving even more ambitious targets for 2025/26:

- FDS: 80%
- 62-Day Standard: 75%

These achievements reflect the hard work and dedication of all teams involved in cancer services across the region.

Bringing teledermatology to life across the region

The SWAG Cancer Alliance is expanding the use of teledermatology to improve diagnosis of skin cancer. This allows consultants to assess high-quality images of skin lesions remotely, reducing the need for patients to attend hospital appointments.

Patients referred by their GP will be invited to a local imaging hub, where trained staff will take images using specialist cameras. A consultant will then review these and decide whether to discharge the patient, request a follow-up, or book a procedure.

Early pilots show a 60–70% drop in face-to-face appointments, improving patient experience and freeing up clinical time. Trusts across the region are adopting the approach at different stages, and we'll be sharing progress as it continues.

Meeting demand and improving access

Urgent skin cancer referrals have risen 170% since 2021, and dermatology waiting lists are up 82%. Teledermatology provides a quicker, more efficient way to manage demand, especially when many referrals are found to be benign. SWAG-funded pilots show reduced in-person visits without compromising care quality.

Understanding the Value: York Health Economics Evaluation

To assess the full impact, the York Health Economics Consortium (YHEC) is analysing data from pilot sites and past evaluations. Their model will estimate costs and benefits compared to traditional care.

SWAG is helping YHEC access key data to give local systems a clearer view of what works best, supporting better commissioning and outcomes for patients and services.

The Cancer Care Map is a free online resource designed to help people across the UK find cancer support services. It is run by the Richard Dimbleby Cancer Fund and currently lists more than 5,500 verified services.

Each listing is carefully checked before it is added and reviewed every three months to ensure the information remains accurate and up to date. The resource is embedded into several platforms

including the SWAG Cancer Alliance website, so that the information is available wherever people search for support.

In 2024, Cancer Care Map launched its first formal partnership with SWAG Cancer Alliance. This collaboration built on earlier work by a member of the SWAG Patient and Public Voice Group, who created a local library of support services.

As a result of this partnership, a localised version of Cancer Care Map now sits directly on the <u>SWAG Cancer Alliance website</u>, making it easier than ever for people to find the help and support they need, close to home.

SWAG Lung Cancer Screening programme showcased at Westminster



On 8th May, Dr Anna Bibby was invited to present at 'Inside Healthcare' – a stakeholder engagement meeting held at Portcullis House, Westminster. The purpose of the meeting was to highlight the findings of the National Confidential Enquiry into Patient Outcomes and Deaths (NCEPOD) 2024 report into prison healthcare.

Anna presented the work undertaken by the <u>SWAG Lung Cancer</u> <u>Screening programme</u> which delivered screening to men within HMP Leyhill in Gloucestershire. The meeting was attended by the Shadow Minister for Justice, Dr Kieran Mullen, and the MP for Wells and Mendip Hills, Tessa Munt, who also sits on the Commons Select Committee for Justice. Anna's presentation was well-received and generated discussion around the ageing prison population, and the challenges of ensuring ongoing medical care provision within the prison service, and subsequently, upon release.



RUH Bath trialling new digital tool to speed up diagnosis and treatment

Royal United Hospitals Bath NHS Foundation Trust (RUH) is one of two trusts to be using a new digital tool called Cancer 360 to help speed up cancer diagnosis and treatment. It's part of the NHS's Federated Data Platform (FDP) and is designed to reduce delays and improve outcomes for people with cancer.

Cancer 360 brings together important patient information, like test results, appointments, and treatment plans, into one easy-to-use dashboard for clinicians. This helps teams make faster, better-informed decisions about patient care.

So far, it's being used for four types of cancer, with more to be added soon. As more staff and tumour sites start using the tool, it's expected to bring even greater benefits. RUH is working closely with NHS England and tech partner Palantir to improve Cancer 360 and help evaluate how well it works. This will support future improvements and a wider rollout.
