Cancer Vaccine Launch Pad (CVLP) Update



We were delighted to welcome Tony Timlin, our new Project Manager for SWAG's CVLP, at last month's Clinical Leadership Forum.

It was also great to see our Gloucestershire CVLP team given a special mention in the national CVLP Newsletter recently, after they were nominated for the Exceptional Contribution to Research, Teaching, Innovation or Quality Improvement Award at Cheltenham Hospital.

We have since secured a £50k Regional Research Delivery Network (RRDN) strategic award from the National Institute

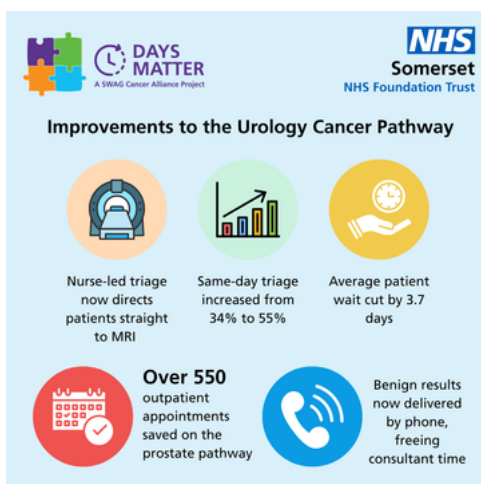
for Health and Care Research (NIHR). This funding will accelerate CVLP delivery, expand capacity, and help us achieve the 150-day set-up ambition across SWAG. Our goal is a virtual CVLP research hub that will make us a key destination for cancer vaccines and next-generation immune-based therapies, as well as enabling us to deliver vaccines locally.

New trial: The ROSETTA Breast-01 Immunotherapy Clinical Trial

The Cancer Vaccine Launch Pad team are initiating the adoption of another trial to the CVLP: the ROSETTA Breast-01 (BNT327-05) immunotherapy clinical trial for previously untreated locally recurrent inoperable or metastatic triple negative breast cancer (TNBC) patients. This is in addition to the ROSETTA Lung-02 study for non-small cell lung cancer patients.

CVLP sites will be mobilised to screen potential patients for referral into the study, with the first site opening by March 2026. Please share this with any relevant breast cancer contacts within your network that may be interested in taking part.

The World's First Trial of a Vaccine to Prevent Lung Cancer

In a world-first clinical trial, Cancer Research UK scientists will begin testing an experimental vaccine designed to prevent lung cancer in people at high risk of the disease.

Lung cancer accounts for 20% of cancer deaths each year in the UK, and remains the leading cause of cancer deaths. Only 1 in 10 people diagnosed with lung cancer will survive longer than 10 years.

Now, researchers from the University of Oxford and University College London have developed a preventative vaccine called [LungVax](#), which has the potential to save lives by cutting people's lung cancer risk. Lab tests have shown it can prime the immune system to recognise and kill abnormal lung cells before they become cancerous.
